Section 4. Petitions for nomination to any elective town office shall be substantially in the following form, to-wit:

We, the undersigned legal voters of the town of Stayton, Oregon, respectfully request that you cause to be printed on the official nominating ballot for the office of _____, the name of M. J. [unclear], as a candidate for nomination to said office.

I, the undersigned, being first duly sworn say upon oath that I am a legal voter of the town of Stayton, Oregon; that I personally know all the persons who have signed this petition; that their signatures are genuine and that each of said persons are legal voters of said town of Stayton, Oregon.

Section 5. Primary nominating petitions shall be signed by at least 10 per cent. of the legal voters of said town of Stayton, as shown by the total vote cast at the last general election held within said town. Each petition before being filed shall have attached thereto a statement from the candidate named therein, as follows:

To _____, recorder, and the legal voters of the town of Stayton, Oregon; I hereby certify that if I am nominated, I will accept the nomination, and will not withdraw, and if elected will duly qualify for such office.

Section 6. Petitions for nomination shall be filed with the recorder at least ten days before the primary election. It shall be the duty of the recorder to place the name of each candidate as shown by such petitions, on the official ballot for the office named in such petition.

Section 7. The general primary election shall be held biennially at the same time and places the general state primary election is held.

Section 8. A candidate for the office of mayor, marshal, recorder, or treasurer, who receives a majority of all the votes cast for such office, shall be declared duly elected, and no further election shall be held for such office;

provided, however, that if there be three or more candidates for any such office and no candidate receives a majority of all the votes cast for said office, the two candidates receiving the largest number of votes for any such office shall be certified by the canvassing board as nominees for such office at the regular election.

Section 9. There being two candidates to be elected for the office of councilman, the following rules shall apply for the nomination and election of councilmen:

If there are four or less candidates for nomination to the office of councilman, the two receiving the largest number of votes at such primary election shall be declared duly elected, and no further election shall be held for the office of councilman.

Section 10. If there be more than four candidates for nomination to the office of councilman and no candidate receives a majority of all the votes cast at such election, to be determined by the total vote cast as shown by the poll book, the four candidates receiving the largest number of votes shall be certified by the canvassing board as candidates to be voted upon at the general election.

Section 11. If there be more than four candidates for nomination to the office of councilman and any two shall receive a majority of all the votes cast as shown by the poll book, they shall be declared duly elected and no further election shall be held for the office of councilman.

Section 12. If there be more than four candidates for nomination to the office of councilman, and only one candidate shall receive a majority of all the votes cast as shown by the poll book such candidate shall be declared duly elected, and the next two candidates receiving the largest number of votes shall be certified by the canvassing board as candidates, only one of whom shall be elected at the general election.

Section 13. All ballots designed to be voted shall be printed in black ink upon a good quality of white paper and shall be alike and the same size. Duplicate impressions of the same shall be printed upon a cheaper and colored paper so as to be readily distinguished from the white ballots, which colored ballots shall be used solely as sample ballots for the information and convenience of voters and shall not be voted and if voted shall not be counted.

Section 14. The ballots shall be styled, "Official Ballot, Town of Stayton", with the date of the election held when they are intended to be used. They shall be arranged as near as practicable to the official ballots arranged under the general laws of Oregon, for state and county elections, and the said official ballots shall be substantially in the following form:
