ORDINANCE NO. 133.

A Bill for an Ordinance providing for the manner of collection and the payment of fines and penalties imposed for violation of town ordinances, and providing for the working of town prisoners upon the streets, parks, buildings or other property of the Town of Stayton, and repealing Ordinance No. 8 and all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith.

THE TOWN OF STAYTON DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Whenever any person against whom a fine or penalty has been adjudged for violation of any of the town ordinances, shall fail, neglect or refuse to pay the same he shall be committed to the Town jail one day for each and every \$2.00 of such fine and costs.

Section 2. Any male person who shall be duly committed to the Town jail in default of payment of any fine assessed against him as a penalty for violation of any of the ordinances of said town, shall be and he is hereby compelled to work out said fine, at the rate of one day's dervice for every \$2.00 of said fine and costs, upon the public streets, parks, buildings or other property belonging to the Town of Stayton, Oregon, said work to be done under the direction of the Marshal or Street Commissioner, or such other person as may be designated by the Marshal or Street Commissioner for that purpose.

Section 3. Any prisoner as aforesaid who shall pay into the hands of the Marshal, after such committment, the balance due upon such fine and costs shall be instantly released from the operation of this ordinance, and shall be discharged upon the docket of the Recorder's Court upon the report of the Marshall of such payment.

Section 4. It shall be lawful for the Marshal to use such manacles and other customary methods of restraint in the working of said prisoners as to him shall appear necessary and proper.

Section 5. That Ordinance No. 8 and all Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith be and the same are hereby repealed.
