# Letter from City Hall - "Buckets" and Budgets



Hello, it's your City Manager here. We hope you're enjoying the new monthly newsletter with more up-to-date information and even more community content. There is so much happening in Stayton right now and we are really excited about all the upcoming projects that are planned.

One thing I hear a lot about are the streets. We hear your concerns. "*The streets!* Why does the City not just fix the streets?" The reasons are complicated, to say the least. Projects like these can take years of planning and labor to complete. Moreover, all aspects of our infrastructure—such as streets, water systems, and sewers—are interconnected in various ways. When you talk about improving the

streets you need to consider all the utilities built into them, as well as the businesses and other operations that depend on those utilities and infrastructures.

Over the next several months, we will be talking about streets, street funding, and asking for the community's input to help us prioritize where to start and where to go. But before that, I wanted to take a moment to talk about how funding and budgeting works in general.

Local government budgets can be visualized as several "buckets". Some "buckets" can be spent on a wide variety of things, while other "buckets" are very restrictive and their funds can only be spent on specific things. These "buckets" help fund projects like the wastewater line upsizing on Ida Street, discussing and planning for improvements at Mill Creek Park, or planning stormwater improvements. Some may ask, "Why these project and not others?". The answer is funding for those project comes from different "buckets" and can only be spent on those types of improvements and projects. For example, the \$4.8 million the city received from Federal and State last month is a special fund that can only be used for Stormwater and Wastewater improvements.

This is a very short and simplified explanation, but I encourage you to review the budget and consider attending the upcoming Budget Committee meetings **May 13, 15 and, if needed, 16** to learn more about how the City is proposing to spend money in the differing "buckets" we received. The current year's budget will be available by **May 6th** and can be seen at <u>www.staytonoregon.gov/page/finance\_budgets</u>.

The Sergeants also received a fair share of comments and compliments for the diligent work carried out by the Stayton Police Department.


We plan to host a forum again in the future, and we hope to see many new faces at the next one!







# Reminder: Tree Maintenance and Chemical Safety



Summer is around the corner which means spring cleaning, the smell of fresh cut grass, and household improvement projects.

As a reminder, our City Municipal Code requires that tree branches be trimmed to **10 feet above streets**, and **8 feet above sidewalks**. Grass should be cut to **10 inches and lower**.

We would also ask that you remain cautious when using chemicals around your property. Please do not pour excess pesticides or herbicides into streets, drains, or storm basins. Check the back of your product's label for proper disposal instructions or

review general safe disposal guidelines at <u>www.epa.gov/safepestcontrol/safe-disposal-pesticides</u>. Also for your safety, please do not tamper with storm drains. If you experience any issues, lost property, or emergency, near or in the storm basins, please contact Public Works at (503) 769-2919.
