

### **Re-opening of Wilderness Park**

The City of Stayton has placed a measure on the November 2025 ballot to renew and increase its current Parks and Pool local option levy.

With funding from this levy, the City will be able to enter into a new lease agreement with the Santiam Water Control District, which owns the land where Wilderness Park is located. This partnership would re-establish public access to one of the area's most scenic environments, full of rich ecology.

Wilderness Park offers trails through forested areas and marshlands. The park has long been a favorite among hikers, bird watchers, families, and those looking to connect with nature without leaving the Stayton city limits.



The levy will also help with maintenance of newer parks and amenities such as Riverfront Park South.

#### **More Parks and Pool Levy Facts**

Why the Increase?

The primary reason for the increase for both the parks and pool are the rising costs in staffing, equipment, utilities, and supplies.

What is the Proposed Levy and How will it Impact Me?

The levy is a tax on property, therefore it will directly impact you if you pay property taxes. The proposed rate is \$1.10 per \$1,000 assessed value.

The average assessed value in Stayton is \$252,000, which would mean a change from approximately \$126/year with the current levy to approximately \$277/year for the proposed levy. It is important to note that the assessed value is not the market value of the home.

### **Smoke Testing in Fall 2025**

The City will continue smoke testing throughout Stayton in Fall 2025 to identify issues within sewer lines.

The City will be conducting smoke testing throughout the community as part of an ongoing effort to identify and address issues within the sewer system.

Smoke testing is a common and effective method used to detect problems lines. sewer introducing non-toxic smoke into the sewer system, crews can identify defects such as broken or cracked sewer laterals — the pipes that connect individual properties to the main sewer line.





Smoke testing can also identify cross connections, where storm drains are tied into the city sewer main. By identifying and fixing cross connections, we can prevent storm water from entering the sewer system, which can overload pipes and treatment facilities. Excess storm water in the sewer system can also cause backups, overflows, added strain and on the wastewater treatment plant.

Residents may notice smoke coming from holes in the ground during testing. This is normal and not harmful.
