First off, please be aware that I am not the author of *The Hatchery*. I am promoting this publication in behalf of my father, Robert P. Mobley, who is the author. My father, Robert "Bob" now deceased, at 95 years old, had lived in Oregon since the age of three years old. The Mobley Family homesteaded property east of Gates, across the Santiam from Niagra. He logged, hunted, fished, and worked. To help support his mom, dad, and twelve brothers and sisters during the depression, he worked on CCC projects, manned fire watch towers and fought fire during the Tillamook burn. He was a naval fleet tanker veteran of World War II in the pacific theater. After the war he simultaneously worked in Salem as a fireman and eventually became station chief, moon lighted various jobs, built their home by himself, went to college and raised three young girls. He got his degree in public education and worked at the state Board of Education. His training and life's work led Bob and a few like-minded indi-

scape and climate quite different from those of southern Connecticut, where I grew up, and the Great Lakes region, where I lived for many adult years, and my difficult adjustment to losing the teaching position for which I'd come here.

My second book is *No Constant Hues*, a larger and more wide-ranging collection, published in 2015 by Turnstone Books of Oregon.
